rec·i·proc·i·ty: the practice of exchanging things with others for mutual benefit

The Reciprocity Project is an <u>I Am a Rural Teacher</u> Pilot Program in collaboration with the Welsh Government, Rural Schools Collaborative, Teton Science Schools, University of Denver, and the University of Colorado—Denver.

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Reciprocity Project Purpose: To explore the feasibility of developing a *uniquely rural* network of international teachers and school leaders that will work together in support of place-based instruction that connects learning to communities and the world around us.

Project Goals:

- Establish a cohort of international rural teaching partners who will participate in the pilot project.
- Establish a corresponding school leaders learning community, which will support the pilot project and participate in an international dialogue on the importance of local to global connections.
- Provide a facilitative framework that will provide direct assistance to teachers in support of project implementation.
- Provide direct assistance to school leaders and the learning community.

- Work with the *I Am a Rural Teacher Campaign* to create project narratives that will communicate the work of participating teachers, school leaders, and their respective students. This effort should strongly emphasize the uniqueness of this rural-based project.
- Secure funding support for a Summer 2024 Forum in Wales.
- Establish an appropriate assessment model for this project.

Project Description:

- 20-30 rural teacher participants from the United States, Wales, and Northern Ireland will
 participate.
- The Project will include teachers who are working with students between the ages of 10-13, although there may be exceptions.
- Participating teachers will be paired with another teacher from a different nation, and together they will explore and develop curricular projects that will engage their respective students in shared work. Principals or headteachers from participating schools will participate in a rural leadership networked community.
- These "collaborative learning activities" will compliment existing curricula and should not be perceived as an "add on" or "extra burdens" for the participating teachers.
- Student learning activities should be place-based and strive to promote rural resilience and sustainability.
- The Reciprocity Project will occur during the 2023-24 school year and culminate in an inperson Forum, which will be held in Wales.

Facilitation Roles:

- Coordinate the launch, development, implementation, and culminating events of the Reciprocity Project.
- Provide tangible assistance to participating teachers in curriculum and student learning development.
- Facilitate discussion among leaders around common problems of practice.
- Maintain open communication with Project lead partners, participants, and funders.
- Produce project narratives telling the stories of participating teachers, students, and school leaders.
- Provide content to the *I Am a Rural Teacher Campaign* and, subsequently, ensure that all project partners are informed of communications works and highlights.
- Coordinate the work of lead partners and potential funders in planning the 2024 Forum in Wales.
- Coordinate the development and implementation of a project assessment model.

Participating teachers will:

- 1. Foster and maintain an open and collaborative relationship with their peer teachers/.international teaching partner.
- 2. Teaching partners will co-design appropriate place-based learning activities with their students, with support of project facilitators.
- 3. Explore appropriate student learning activities that focus on sustainability, community building, and rural resilience.
- 4. Agree to meet virtually with the project facilitators at times that are convenient for the teacher's schedule and timeframe.
- 5. Be willing to share their stories and experiences with Project Facilitators.
- 6. Participate in the international Project Forum in Wales. More details will be forthcoming.

School Leaders will:

- 1. Support and endorse their schools' teacher's participation in the Project.
- 2. Participate in a virtual "Learning Community" of international school leaders. (All efforts will be made to ensure the "Learning Community" is respectful of people's time.)
- 3. Share stories about their schools and communities with Project Facilitators.
- 4. Consider attending the planned Summer 2024 Forum in Wales.

Timeline:

- September 2023—Facilitators will have hold planning sessions with all participating teachers. This may be done individually, in pairs, or in a larger virtual group.
- October 2023—Facilitators will begin providing narrative content to the I am A Rural Teacher campaign and lead partners.
- January 2024—Participating teachers and their students will be engaged in some level of shared instructional activity.
- March 2024—Final plans for the Forum will be in place.
- April 2024—Travel arrangements for Forum participants will be finalized.
- Summer 2024—Forum will be held!
